
FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT 2013

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

SOFTPOTS AT ST. MARY'S PRIMARY SCHOOL

Softpots are colourful handmade fabric plant containers that can be made to suit all environments, indoor and out. They are much kinder to plants than conventional plastic or terracotta plant pots. The Softpot containers can grow all sorts of fruits, flowers, trees, vegetable and herbs with remarkable success. They are the perfect urban solution to gardening in small spaces, and can utilize many recycled materials in their construction, helpful to reduce landfill.

The youngsters of St. Mary's enjoyed getting their hands dirty and filling their fabric containers with pebbles, compost, soil, vermiculite and water gel before decorating the pot itself. Once the Softpots were completed the pupils planted a narcissi or a pansy. The pupils livened up the corridors of their school by placing them on the windowsills for everyone to enjoy.
