WRHS Mock Election

Politics comes to life!

On Thursday 7th May 2015 the nation entered small rooms around the country to cast their vote in the General Election, people across the country hoping for different outcomes depending

on what they believed in. Here at Whalley Range we had our own Mock Election which really brought politics to life for the students, giving them a range of ways to get involved. There were four main parties all standing for election and delivering outstanding presentations to the school in the week leading up to the general election, clearly outlining their beliefs and what they stand for.

On the day of the election, over 1400 students piled into the hall one by one to cast their vote in our secret ballot, the hall buzzing with excitement as they did so. There was much anticipation throughout the day as to which way the vote would go, some predicting a marginal Labour win, others predicting a surprise victory for the Green party. All the votes were counted and in stark contrast to the actual General Election the Whalley Range polls resulted in a Labour landslide with 92% of the overall vote, winning by a large majority in every year group.

The Mock Election excited many of the students and brought to life what was a really important issue at the time. All those involved in campaigning took a lot from it and did a wonderful job at not just teaching the students a thing or two about politics, but also many of the teachers as well.



Tales from Lands afar

For the last year, a Year 9 German class have been taking part in a scheme run by the University of Manchester, entitled "Adopt a third year student". We were lucky to be linked with Lauren Evans (pictured right), a Languages student, who has been spending the year in Germany and China. 


YEAR 5 PRIMARY MATHS CHALLENGE


Siemens Engineer Talk




MANCHESTER DAY
