Alice in Wonderland was a truly unforgettable experience for all involved!




THE CLASS OF 1971

Whalley Range 11-18 High School has been lucky enough to be selected to be part of the pilot group for the Co-operative Identity Mark. During the Summer Term staff across the school worked hard to put together a file of evidence for the award. The Co-operative Identity Mark provides a framework to help schools determine the extent to which they put co-operative values into practice. It also helps capture information about the benefit the school provides to the wider community. The Mark addresses key areas of the school's work, focusing particularly on governance,



curriculum, pedagogy, staff development and community engagement.

On 12th June, Jacky Davies, Trust Co-ordinator at Whalley Range 11-18 High School, visited Birches Head High School in Stoke on Trent along with a member of staff from Fountains Primary, Burton on Trent and an externally trained assessor. They spent the day talking to staff, students and members of the local community as part of their assessment process. Then on 15th June it was



Whalley Range 11-18 High School's turn. 2 members of staff from Royds Hall School in Huddersfield, along with the external assessor spent the day at the school. The feedback was fantastic! And, after a wait, we were awarded the Co-operative Identity Mark, graded at Developing.

We particularly enjoyed the opportunity to visit another school to see how they approach the Co-operative ethos in different ways. We are now working on a 3 year plan to ensure that all the Co-operative Values are fully embedded into school life."

The Connexions service is in school all day Monday, Tuesday mornings, and all day Thursday to meet with the Year 11 students for their one-to-one meetings. Both Katie and Sophie are also available for help during breaks and lunchtimes on the days they are in. Deleta Haughton, Connexions Assistant comes into school once a month to help students with applications for part time jobs and volunteering. YEAR 11 FINANCIAL LITERACY

Year 11 students sat their Maths GCSE exam at the start of November. Following this, in their maths lessons, the students have spent two weeks investigating a wide range of issues linked to financial decisions they will need to make in the near future.

Students focused on how attitudes to money affect everyday life. They looked at the costs of running a car, types and costs of car insurance and the legal side of motoring. They rated careers according to job satisfaction and salaries, learned the difference between gross and net salary and how to calculate income tax. Finally they investigated the costs of living independently and compared the cost of living in various parts of the UK. Students became aware of their own attitudes to money and that other people may feel differently.

After last year's success with Accelerated Reader, we have now decided to run the program across all of KS3. So far this year, on average, all students have raised their reading age by four months

within a two month period across KS3. Students enjoy quiet reading time, paired/shared reading time and the opportunity of having others listen to them read independently. Students also have the opportunity to broaden their vocabulary knowledge and they are tested on a regular basis. It is a particularly accessible method of learning for students who are learning English as an additional language. 
WRHS HOSTS DEBATE MATE 2012


SCHOOL GAMES CREW CONFERENCE
