BBC SCHOOL REPORT


Showcasing our young reporters!

Two South Manchester teenagers have shown their community spirit and green credentials by raising money to buy 100 trees for their neighbourhood.

Korrelle Cole and Jessica Moores-Flectcher, both 14 years old and students at Whalley Range 11 –18 High School, came up with the idea while doing work experience with construction company GB Building Solutions who are currently undertaking a £17m new build and redevelopment at the school. As part of their work experience, the students were challenged with creating and delivering a project that would enhance the local area. Korrelle and Jessica came up with the idea of collecting and recycling used aluminium cans from around the school and using the money raised to buy 100 trees for the community.

Andy Wertylo, GB Building Solutions Site Manager, said: "I wanted the girls' time with us to be productive as well as giving them a task that they had to manage themselves in a given timescale and to really get a feel for the industry and working life in general. They came up with the idea of the tree planting and really threw themselves into the project wholeheartedly. They were fantastic workers and are an absolute credit to their school".

The girls produced a proposal and procurement document that outlined how many cans the school generates on a daily basis, how many needed to be collected to pay for the trees and sourced a company that agreed to collect and pay for the cans. Korelle said, "Working on this project with GB Solutions

has really inspired me and I am definitely now considering a career in construction".
