THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF OUR NEW BUILDING

Building Blocks for the Future



On Friday 25th November we held the official opening of our new building. We were delighted to welcome World Champion BMX Cyclist Shanaze Reid to cut the ribbon and to share some words of wisdom with students, staff and

specially invited guests. Our musical and dramatic talent opened the event with some superb individual and group performances. The reliable and respected Sports Leaders watched over the event before showing their own sporting respect with a guard of honour as Shanaze approached the new building that Nurs referred to as 'spectacular and majestic' in her vote of thanks. Shanaze's message and driving motivation were clear. Hard work, excellent facilities and being the best that you can be, is the combination for success in sport, and hopefully will earn her an Olympic gold next summer. If our students take this message to heart and try to live it then their success will come, not necessarily in the form of Olympic medals but in the wide and varied careers and life choices that they make, and that make our students and our school so unique.









RESEARCH IN RESIDENCE

This term Whalley Range High School had an exciting opportunity to take part in a very interesting research project. Robert Mansfield is a PhD student at the Manchester University studying Freshwater Ecology based on the Manchester Ship Canal.

In one session we had the chance to visit Chorlton Brook where we did the 'kick' test in the water to gather organisms in that ecosystem. We classified, identified





and counted the invertebrates to observe what lived in the Brook. This activity also helped us understand how polluted the Brook was due to the presence of indicator species in the sample.

We also got to make our own microcosms with different species of plankton. This was an interesting practical but my favourite was the one we did with liquid nitrogen. Liquid nitrogen freezes objects as it's very cold (around -200°C). We dipped different objects into it which froze them, and hit them with a hammer causing them to 'shatter'. For example, we froze a rose and it shattered as we hit it with a hammer. 'It was great fun' as quoted by a member of the research team (Henna Javed, year 12).

The day was a huge success and the fund raising team managed to raise a very impressive £962.30!




MUSIC FOR ALL
