


WELCOMING OUR NEW STUDENTS

Colouring in isn't just for young children, it's a tremendous meditative and creative activity for everyone too.




Read a book 😯 🚱 😡 😈

HOW TO AVOID THE 'SUMMER SLIDE'

Lockdown home learning has been a challenge for all of us and with summer around the corner, it's important to keep reading in order to maintain and improve this vital skill.

The 'Summer slide' is a term used to describe the loss of academic skills that may occur to students when school is not in session; this is attributed largely to the lack of reading. This phenomenon may become amplified this year due to the early closing of schools, in response to the current coronavirus epidemic.

Just like exercising keeps muscles in shape, reading keeps the brain in shape. If you don't exercise, you lose muscle, and if a child doesn't read, they will lose literacy skills. This is why summer reading is so essential. Not only will it support a child's ability to retain subject knowledge learnt the previous year, but also to grow in knowledge and critical thinking skills for the coming year.

It is common knowledge that students who read more are better readers. It has also been shown in numerous studies that student academic success is defined by a students' ability to read fluently and skilfully. Therefore, we must encourage our students to read as much as possible both in school and outside school and summer is an excellent opportunity to reading for pleasure.

At Whalley Range we believe it is necessary for our students to read on a daily basis for at least an hour. This means taking time out to read a book for pleasure - not reading an Instagram post (it doesn't count!). We are very lucky at Whalley Range to have a fabulous set of resources to support reading for pleasure.



Ways you can support your daughter's reading skills:

- Download the 'Borrow Box' app. This is an app that allows you to sign up to your local library remotely and download audiobooks and ebooks. You could go for a walk whilst listening to your favourite audio book or have a routine of reading for an hour before bed to improve your sleep and encourage your daughter to do the same. If children see adults reading they are more likely to read themselves.

- Check out the virtual LRC page on Frog. This page has great book recommendations if your daughter needs some inspiration and you can also take part in book review competitions.
- Free book. If your daughter is in year 7/8/9 then they will have received a free book with the KS3 work pack. It would be good to ask them to read the book aloud to you or alternatively they could read to an older or younger sibling or family member.
- Book guizzes. Asking your daughter questions about her book and talking about the characters and their dilemmas helps children understand relationships and discuss difficult issues. You could try asking your daughter to give you a review of the book or talk about their favourite character.


WEEKLY MATHS QUIZ
