

The 20th October saw G207 turned into a crime scene so that the Y13 criminology students could help solve a murder and then take the Defendant to court!

The day started with the discovery of a dead body in G207 and a 999 call to the emergency services.

Students then took on a number of roles such as Crime Scene Investigators, police, expert witnesses and legal staff.

They spent the morning working with an ex member of Merseyside Police working the crime scene looking for clues and trying to find incriminating evidence. There was plenty to pick up on from blood splatter evidence to footprints and fingerprints to clues left at the scene as well as the body of the victim herself.

Students studied witness testimonies looking for potential clues to 'who-done-it's'. Alongside this they learnt about forensic evidence, how its collected and used in a real criminal case. They looked at some real-life cases and how the police investigated them.

All students were able to take their own fingerprints and were taught what things the real forensic experts look for.

The afternoon session saw the class turned into a courtroom and all students were assigned roles from the judge, defence and prosecution barristers, expert witnesses, eyewitnesses, defendant and jury members. Proceedings started off a little subdued but once the students became comfortable with their roles the courtroom certainly livened up and questioning between 'members of the court' became heated.

Feedback from students was really positive and they certainly felt that the day helped them understand their Unit 3 work better.

Students competed in a variety of athletics events against other schools. These are the first events that students were able to compete in for over 18 months.





The KS4 event took place early in October and we had several successes, with Sehr winning a gold medal in the shot putt; Alejandra winning silver in the high jump and Khadijah winning silver in the 800m. Fantastic results with limited training time.

In November, over 70 students in years 8 and 9 expressed interest in competing and 25 students were selected for trials. The enthusiasm and effort during the trials evening was wonderful to see. There were many successes throughout the KS3 event with Scarlett and Hanna winning silver and bronze medals in the long jump and Kayla winning silver in the shot putt.

We also won medals on the track! Well done to Jumainah who won bronze in 800m, Fatima – bronze in 300m and Antilia who won bronze in both the 60m and 200m sprints.

All of the students showed fantastic resilience, determination and thoroughly enjoyed the experience. Well done to everyone that participated in the trials and competitions and I know students are looking forward to athletics starting back up in the Spring!

lessons as part of their first module. This is an excellent opportunity to build employability skills, challenge their leadership abilities and attain another asset for their


