MU FOUNDATION LEADHERS DELIVER A HUB TOURNAMENT

During half term 2, as part of our partnership with Manchester United Foundation, our Year 9 Lead MER's hosted and led a Girls' MU Foundation Hub Tournament for both Year 9 and 10 students.

For four weeks pre-tournament, ten of our Year 9 students participated in a female engagement intervention called the MU Foundation Lead HERship Programme. The programme gave these students the opportunity to run a Hub Football Tournament, learning about the responsibilities and skills needed to host such an event.

The students took on roles and responsibilities such as refereeing, site manager, fixture maker, conflict manager, first aider, publicity / photographer, and chaperones.

Overall, the tournament was a huge success. Our Lead HERs were extremely professional and a credit to the school.

I have been a volunteer French mentor now for a few months, and I really have enjoyed every second of it. I have worked closely with students, not only in my class, but in others, to help develop their French speaking abilities and work on their pronunciation.

I helped my mentees memorise their speaking questions and answers in preparation for their speaking GCSE, by first ensuring that they knew what they had written in English. Then, I made them repeat small sections of the sentence around 5 times. They pieced the sentence together, and by the end, they were able to confidently answer the questions.

Mentoring has been a very rewarding experience for me and has given me the ability to listen and help other people. As someone who wants to be a teacher in the future, mentoring has enabled me to understand others and know how to deliver helpful advice.

I would really recommend becoming a mentor if you have valuable skills that you feel would be beneficial to others, or a mentee if you feel you require a bit of an extra push to reach your target grade, or above!


MEDIA Studies



YEAR 7 ENGLISH

SALFORD MUSEUM TRIP





In November, for the fourth year, the English faculty took 35 Year 7 students to Salford Museum. Situated on the grounds of Salford University, the museum boasts an extensive collection of Victorian era art and artefacts. Not only do students get to immerse themselves in the material culture of the time, but it provides an essential understanding of the particulars and peculiarities of the age.

Students had the chance to examine items from the era and make predictions on their use. Who would have thought Victorian ladies required a special instrument to put on a pair of gloves? Students were equally astounded and perhaps a little horrified to learn of deportment boards: rigid wooden implements attached to students' backs to make them sit up straight in lessons.

The second part of the visit involved exploring the museum's most enchanting recreated Victorian street. After World War Two, the museum recovered a number of old Victorian era shop fronts and signs. The street includes a Victorian sweet shop, a shoe cobbler and a pub with a sign to remind patrons at the time that children

under the age of 13 must be accompanied by an adult!

Students enjoyed the opportunity to step back in time and appreciate the experiences and struggles of people in the Victorian era. Students came away from the visit with some invaluable knowledge of the era to enrich their cultural appreciation and contextual understanding which will feature often in their English and history lessons in their future learning journeys.
