We're delighted to announce that from April 2024 we will partner with Innovate, who will work with our existing catering staff to provide an exceptional catering experience. The team will be serving exciting menus packed with healthy ingredients, that are full of variety, and with lots of interesting new things to try. It's important that the food tastes as good as it looks, and we're sure our students (and staff) won't be disappointed.

What's on the menu?

Innovate has long been considered the most inventive school caterer and that's because they're very clear about their food. All dishes will be prepared every day using quality, fresh and seasonal ingredients that are responsibly sourced. As well as ensuring the food on the plate is healthy.

Here's a taste of what's to come:

- A huge selection of 'grab and go' items including baguettes, paninis, burritos and salads to name a few, all using a barcode system to help speed up the queues.

We will ask that this includes a hot main meal, hot wrap, baguette or other nutritious snack plus either a hot pudding, fruit pot or freshly-made cake. Students can also choose to switch the pudding for a drink, if they'd prefer.

In recognition of her dedication, she was presented with the Community Captain's armband and pennant by none other than Bruno Fernandes himself!

Arissa, a previous Whalley Range High School student, has completely turned her life around in the past four years after initially being referred to the Foundation's targeted prevention programme in school where she would take part in workshops develop her confidence and leadership skills.

It was with this support, that Arissa really began to raise her aspirations and make decisions that would give her a better outlook in life. This includes joining the Foundation's Youth Board where she has been a part of social action projects and discussions around youth violence with dignitaries from Greater Manchester Police, Salford Council, and presenting to Greater Manchester Mayor, Andy Burnham.

At the end of 2023, Arissa was successful in joining the Street Games Youth Advisory Board as an advisor, inputting to national policy around youth community sport and engagement.

Thrilled at receiving this award, Arissa said:

It's been amazing to be here, meet Bruno and receive this award; it means a lot to me. Manchester United Foundation is not just football, it's a safe space for a lot of kids. I've always said if I can help a kid like I was helped I think I'd be very grateful.

Inspired by their interaction, Bruno said:

On 29th November 2023 to complement their French course, a group of Year 10 students visited HOME Cinema, with Miss **Boulesteix and Miss Sevellec.**

The students attended a French GCSE study morning, to give them the opportunity to see a film in French and discuss its plot and characters. Isabelle Vanderschelden introduced the film, Le Havre, in French and occasionally in English and provided background information and vocabulary on the main themes of the film (family, migration). The screening was followed by language exercises in French to practice structures and vocabulary that are useful for describing the main characters and the film's settings. Students were also encouraged to comment on the film's style and express critical opinions.

WORLD BOOK DAY 7 MARCH 2024

Promoting a Love of Reading for Students

As part of the school's focus on promoting reading for pleasure, we relish the opportunity to celebrate World Book Day. This involves staff dressing up as their favourite characters to promote discussions around reading for pleasure and lots of competitions in which students can take part.

Fewer than 1 in 2 (47.8%) children aged 8 to 18 said they enjoyed reading in 2022. This is on par with those recorded in early 2020, previously the lowest level since students were first asked the question in 2005. World Book Day is a highly successful and recognised initiative to combat the decline in students' reading for pleasure – and Whalley Range High School is proud to celebrate reading for pleasure alongside 1000s of other schools nationally.

As well as providing every student in main school with a book token for a book of their choice, over the course of the day students had the chance to take part in lots of exciting activities and competitions to encourage them to engage with reading for pleasure:

FORM TIME QUIZ

Students had to identify the members of staff reading, either from recognising their voice or from a picture where their faces were hidden by a book.

A READATHON AT LUNCH

Mrs Wicikowski provided a quiet place for students to come and read their books and score points for their form.

TREASURE HUNT

Members of staff wore lanyards with book clues for students to collect during the day and/or dressed up as their favourite characters. Students completed a treasure hunt to collect as many of the lanyard clues as possible to be entered into a prize draw to win prizes. This encouraged staff to promote their love of reading with the students and inspire their students to read the books they were promoting.

BOOKMARKS AND LRC COMPETITIONS

Students were also encouraged to attend the library to take part in competitions and students had the opportunity to create their own bookmark.



Overall the day was a huge success with a real buzz created about reading around the school. It was great to see students engaging in discussions around reading and enjoying the chance to take part in book-related competitions. World Book Day forms an important part of our constant drive on reading for pleasure, which is celebrated throughout the year.

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This year's Duke of Edinburgh's award is in full swing, with year 12s already completing their silver practice expedition in November.


In December we enjoyed two presentation afternoons with the Year 11s receiving their awards for last year.

A majority of our year 11 students received a range of certificates including around 150 students achieving their full Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's award. We were pleased to welcome Daniel Broadist from Northwest Duke of Edinburgh who presented the certificates and was very pleased to see the continued hard work of our students to achieve their awards. Well done year 11.

This year's award is also ready to go with 185 year 10s signed up to

complete their expedition this year. The students have been completing their training for the expeditions in lessons and have been practicing their skills with trips to Alexandra Park to apply their navigation skills before their practice walks in May and final expeditions in July. We look forward to celebrating their successes in future editions.

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Year 9 had an introduction to the accredited courses in PE and learned about the content of both GCSE and Cambridge National Sport Studies.
